#### The Season Begins A-New at Aird Fada, by Leigh Eisler

October and November mark the start of the seaweed farming year, with kelps seeded in late autumn. Unlike traditional farming, seaweed requires no freshwater or fertilisers and thrives in the cold winter ocean. Harvesting is dictated by rising ocean temperatures, not the maturity of the seaweed. As winter turns to spring, deep-sea nutrients surface, boosting kelp growth. However, warming waters in April attract plankton, including species that settle on seaweeds, prompting the harvest. In this fourth year of farming, we have sown three species—sugar kelp, winged kelp, and furbelows. We are planning multiple uses for the upcoming crop: some is being sent off for bioplastic research, we will be trialling a seaweed/biochar fertiliser and continuing product development of a kiln-dried seaweed.

#### **Growing Together: Community Forestry in Action**

Autumn is always a busy and exciting time in Forestry and this year has been no exception. In August we welcomed two new staff members to the Forestry Team: Keziah and Andy. Since starting the job, together with Matt, they've been busy getting to know the forest, milling timber, building and fixing fences, making charcoal, keeping an eye on the deer and making exciting plans for the future of the Sawmill and the Forest.



#### Felling and Harvesting

Harvesting on the valley's northeast bank finished in August, marking the last felling at Tiroran until 2029. This gradual process replaces the single-species Sitka spruce plantation with a diverse mixed forest managed under Continuous Cover Forestry (CCF) principles, avoiding clear-felling.

#### Restocking

Planting is underway in the forest's northwest corner near the sawmill. It's exciting to replant this unique area with a mix of native and non-native conifers and broadleaves, chosen for habitat benefits, terrain suitability, and timber quality.



Recent challenges at the mill, including oversized logs and trailer issues, have paused milling temporarily. We're exploring a larger trailer to resume work. Fresh Inverinan larch logs were a welcome change from the older Tiroran stock, and new larch from the island's North end will provide 4.8m timber soon.



#### Lots of fun for everyone

This year, we've hosted some fantastic family events, including the exciting launch of our Nature Trail! Developed with ideas, facts, and illustrations from Bunessan Primary School pupils and our ranger Emily, the trail is now open for all. Start your adventure at Fingal's Giant Chair, and don't miss the hidden fairy village behind the adventure playground!

#### **Winter Gardening Tip**

Protect your soil over winter to prevent erosion. Mulch with seaweed for nutrients, use homemade compost or manure, or cover beds with plain cardboard (no plastic or heavy print) as an effective alternative.
